Concept paper

MAIN ISSUES:

- Organising the first meeting of the Ad Hoc Advisory Group on Child and Youth Participation (MJ-S-CYP) and setting the structures to implement the Terms of Reference of the Group¹
- Promoting and developing the Council of Europe actions on child and youth participation by organising a round table discussion with all relevant stakeholders

Background:

Child participation is one of the three thematical pillars featuring in the 2009 - 2011 Stockholm Strategy for the programme Building a Europe for and with children². The objectives outlined in the Strategy are the following:

- Support of sustainable and meaningful participation at local, national and international level, notably through:
 - Integrating child participation in the various policy areas (mainstreaming),
 - o developing standards and methodologies,

- creating opportunities for dialogue between decision-makers and children, including access to decision- and policy-making structures and processes, and exchanging good practices.
- development of an inclusive approach, focused on schools, health-care systems, justice systems, residental care, families and also targetting particularly vulnerable children;

 empowerement of children by human rights education, by developing and disseminating information in a child-friendly language, in print and on the Internet

Bearing in mind these objectives, a Roadmap for Council of Europe actions on participation of children and young people under the age of 18 has been devised, and the work has started accordingly.

In order to mainstream children's participatory rights into the Council of Europe work on standard setting, monitoring and policy development, an inter-secretariat working group (KID-IN) was established in March 2009. A training course on participation rights and practice for Council of Europe administrators on how to consult children in specific Council of Europe activities was organised in June 2009.

One of the key elements to implement the objectives regarding child participation has been to underpin the work in the experiences of the youth policy sector in the Council of Europe, and with the involvement of its decision making and co-management. structures³ The Ad Hoc Advisory Group on child and youth participation (MJ-S-CYP) was established under the co-management structures⁴ of the Directorate of Youth and Sport. According to the Terms of Reference adopted by the Committee of Ministers, the MJ-S-CYP is responsible for developing the work and the actions further.

The event presented in this paper launches the Council of Europe project on child participation, combining the first meeting of the ad hoc advisory group and a Round Table with a group of relevant stakeholders.

Objectives of the events

a) 1st meeting of the MJ-S-CYP

- To agree on rules of procedure and working methods for the Advisory group
- To set a timetable for the work
- To prepare a plan of action based on the Terms of Reference for the group

b) Round Table discussion

 To introduce the Roadmap 2009 – 2011 for Council of Europe actions on participation of children and young people under the age of 18, and in particular the mandate of the Ad Hoc Advisory Group on child and youth participation (MJ-S-CYP);

 To exchange information on good practices and to seek advice and input from stakeholders for Council of Europe future actions on participation;
