##### **2. Summary**

The numbers of female executives are in the single digits in many countries and there has been a push both by national governments and by the European Union to change that, by quotas. Some like Germany want such measures, others like the UK don't. In our exchange, we explored the different perspectives and also how minorities besides women (as defined by religion, ethnicity, etc.) saw this issue in order to cover it as diversely as possible, and to see how it broadens and deepens our reporting. In the end, it diversified our coverage on an issue already concerning diversity.

##### **3. Dissemination of the Output**

We are in the process of sharing our report with the hundreds of reporters that are part of the network we belong to, Associated Reporters Abroad.
