## **REPORT OF THE 37<sup>th</sup> MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL**

18 March 2007, Lisbon

## **1. Opening of the meeting and adoption of the agenda**

The Chairman, Mr Claude Frey, opened the meeting and welcomed the members of the Executive Council, in particular those that were attending for the first time. He gave a special welcome to the Permanent Representative of Austria to the Council of Europe, Ambassador Wendelin Ettmayer, who was attending the meeting as an observer.

From the Secretariat in Strasbourg, he welcomed the Secretary of the Commission of the Enlarged Agreement on Democracy through Law (“Venice Commission”), Mr Gianni Buquicchio, and the Deputy Chief Executive of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe, Mrs Antonella Cagnolati. Both would be making interventions on possible co-operation between their respective bodies and the North-South Centre during the meeting. Also present was the Director of External and Multilateral Relations, Mr Jack Hanning.

The Chairman thanked the Director General of Education, Culture and Heritage, Youth and Sport (DGIV), Mrs Gabriella Battaini Dragoni, for all her support and help since the administrative transfer of the Centre to her Directorate in 2006.

## **2. Approval of the report of the 36<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Executive Council**

The report of the 36<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Executive Council, held in Lisbon on 27 November 2006, was approved (document: NSC/EC (2006) 2), subject to the inclusion of an amendment received from the President of the Conference of INGOs of the Council of Europe, Mrs Annelise Oeschger.

## **3. Information on the meetings of the Bureau of the Executive Council**

The Chairman gave a report on the main points of the Bureau meeting which had taken place on 16 January 2007 and on other developments. He explained that the Bureau meeting scheduled to take place that morning, prior to the meeting of the Executive Council, had been cancelled due to the fact that a majority of the Bureau members was unable to travel to Lisbon to attend the meeting. He also informed the members of the Executive Council of the retirement of Mr Peter Schieder from the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe (PACE). A new representative would be appointed to replace him on the Bureau and the Executive Council by the PACE. Nevertheless, Mr Scheider had accepted the Bureau’s invitation to continue as President of the Lisbon Forum for an additional year.

### ***- New Representative of the Committee of Representatives of the member States on the Executive Council and the Bureau of the Executive Council***

The Chairman explained that, following the withdrawal of Italy from the Partial Agreement at the end of 2006, there was a vacant seat on the Executive Council. In accordance with the rotation system in place for the member State representation on the Executive Council, this vacant seat would automatically be filled by Spain.

With regard to the vacant seat now left on the Bureau, in line again with the rotation system in place for the member States, a letter would be sent to the remaining countries in Group I (France, Germany, Spain and Portugal) asking them to appoint one of their countries as the new Bureau representative. The Executive Council agreed with the Chairman’s proposal to accept whichever country was appointed. This Representative would be invited to attend the next meeting of the Bureau on 22 June 2007 in Lisbon.

- *Co-operation with the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe*

The Chairman informed the Executive Council that Dr Ian Micallef, President of the Chamber of Local Authorities, had participated at the Bureau meeting of 16 January and expressed the Congress' interest in working more closely with the North-South Centre. More information would be provided on this by the Deputy Chief Executive of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe under point 8 of the agenda.

- *Contacts with regard to enlargement*

The Chairman reported on his recent meetings in Strasbourg with the Permanent Representatives of Monaco and "the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia" to discuss possible membership of the North-South Centre. The Ambassador of "the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia" expressed an interest in joining the Centre and suggested that perhaps a small group of countries from eastern Europe could join at the same time.

The Chairman planned to meet with the Permanent Representatives of Bulgaria, Romania and Serbia during a future visit to Strasbourg.

Finally, he referred to his recent meeting with Ambassador James Sharkey, Permanent Representative of Ireland to the Council of Europe, to discuss the Centre's global education programme. During this meeting, it was agreed that the Co-ordinator of the Global Education and Youth Programme, Mrs Gordana Berjan, would travel to Dublin to hold discussions on the programme and examine ways of reinforcing areas of interest and co-operation.

#### **4. 2006 Annual Activities Report**

The Executive Director of the North-South Centre, Mr José Carlos Correia Nunes, presented the 2006 activities report to the Executive Council and gave information on the activities which had taken place in the last quarter of the year. He reminded the Executive Council that the North-South Prize had been postponed until March 2007 and pointed out that the planned Conference with the theme "Islam and Europe" had not taken place. On the whole, he had a positive evaluation of 2006 and pointed to the improvements that had been made with the internal reforms and financial management and to the contacts that had been made with old and new partners to explore areas of co-operation and possibilities of financial assistance.

With regard to the budget expenditure in 2006, he confirmed that 93% of the core budget and voluntary contributions received had been used. Detailed information on the programme expenditure was now available due to the quarterly budget reporting system now in place in the Council of Europe, including the North-South Centre.

In reply to question from the Representative of Germany, Mr Klaus Tanzberger, on participation at the Global Education Week, the Programme Manager for the Global Education Unit, Mr Miguel Silva, replied that 36 Council of Europe member States had participated, with Germany being represented by the World University Service.

## 5. Implementation of the 2007 programme of activities

The Executive Director presented the main lines of the programme of activities for 2007. He explained that the document completed the renewal of the Centre's programming tools. The articulation between activities and programmes was clearly defined. For each there was a description of goals, expected results, the context and the organisation. A financial table showed the cost of the activity and sources of funding. The total cost of the programme of activities for 2007 was EUR 1,431,000, EUR 330,100 of which would be funded by the Centre's ordinary budget and EUR 300,200 by the special account. The total of voluntary contributions required to make up the budget was EUR 800,700, which constituted a considerable challenge for the Centre.

The Representative of Switzerland, Mr Clemens Birrer, asked for clarification on the exact amount of voluntary contributions still needed to implement the 2007 programme, the different accounts of the North-South Centre and the efforts being made to attract the necessary funds. The Executive Director explained that 50% of the total amount needed in voluntary contributions was to finance activities in the framework of programme two – training and capacity building of young people and youth organisations. He was presently in contacts with various partners including the European Commission, the Portuguese Authorities, the Aga Khan Foundation and the High Commissioner for migration and ethnic minorities in Lisbon (ACIME) to try to secure funding for the 2007 programme. He pointed out that these funds would be needed to implement the programme in the second half of the year and he remained optimistic on receiving positive confirmations in the coming months.

The Director General of Education, Culture and Heritage, Youth and Sport (DGIV), Mrs Gabriella Battaini Dragoni, assured the members of the Executive Council that the Centre had not undertaken any commitment for which funds were not yet available. She explained that these figures had been included in the document in the interest of transparency. With regard to voluntary contributions, she added that, in the framework of the "White Paper on Intercultural Dialogue", some partners involved in the consultation process wished to participate and make contributions but it was too early to identify the exact amounts.

The Representative of Switzerland, Mr Clemens Birrer, suggested that the Centre introduce the same methodology as that used by Headquarters in Strasbourg and list only the assured amount of funds available. The Executive Director explained that this was indeed the case in the 2007 budget document and that, since 2005, the expected voluntary contributions had been omitted from this document. The 2007 programming document was a working document which included the financial information linked to each activity to present as realistic a scenario as possible to the member States and Executive Council.

The Representative of the Netherlands, Mr Marcel Van der Kolk, pointed to a discrepancy between the budget figures in the 2007 budget document (NSC/Bud 2007) and the 2007 programme of activities (NSC/Prog (2006) 5 rev). It was agreed that the Secretariat would provide written clarification on this question.

The Executive Director went on to give a general description of the activities and priority areas for 2007. With regard to the Dialogue programmes, the focus would be on intercultural dialogue in general and the white paper consultation process in particular, as well as the Lisbon Forum and the Conference of Parliamentarians that was also going to be held on the fringe of the Summit of EU-Africa Heads of State. Referring to the Education for Democratic Citizenship

Programme, he explained that the activities in question would allow the sector to position itself better within DGIV and give new impetus to the programme. He informed the Executive Council that the Centre had recently received notification from the German authorities that the national peer review would not be carried out in 2007. With regard to the Youth Programme, he said that the two main activities for this year were the Mollina University and the Europe-Africa Youth Summit, also to be held on the fringe of the Summit of EU-Africa Heads of State.

***- Line of action 1: Raising European public awareness of issues of global interdependence and solidarity through education and young people***

The Co-ordinator of the Global Education and Youth Programme provided some additional information on the priorities for 2007. Attention would be paid to reinforcing the role of the quadrilogue and other partners and to building synergies with them and DGIV. She referred to the Centre's previous support programme designed to strengthen global education in the four Visegrad countries, Czech Republic, Hungary, Poland and Slovakia (V4) and stated that they were trying to relaunch it at the this time. Finally, she informed the Executive Council of the new country profiles on policy structures which the Global Education Unit was currently preparing. The first set of target countries was the member States of the North-South Centre.

The Programme Manager for the Global Education Unit provided information on the Global Education Week and on the draft version of the Global Education Guidelines, the new tool for educators, which had been circulated within the Global Education networks.

The Programme Manager for Youth, Mr Marcos Andrade, gave some additional information on the work planned in the youth sector in 2007. He explained that this work would be a continuation of the previous years with the main aim of guiding and facilitating partnerships in both regional and global youth work. Given the Centre's focus on intercultural dialogue, the youth programme would be contributing to this and would be trying to elevate the role of African youth policy. The Centre would be organising regional consultations in Africa and Europe.

The Representative of the European Youth Forum, Mr Christoffer Gronstad, congratulated the Youth Programme for its work and referred, in particular, to the annual youth university in Mollina and the work of the Centre around the Africa-Europe Youth Summit. He hoped that the Centre would continue to contribute to the work of the Millenium Development Goals.

The Director General welcomed the new dimensions which had been introduced into the Global Education and Youth Programme for the coming year and was pleased that the programme included so many of the Council of Europe processes and that synergies had been developed, especially with DGIV. She also stressed the importance of building on previous processes and achievements. In this context, she referred to the Peer Review Process and the work of the GENE network and proposed that a meeting be organised in Strasbourg in the coming months among all the main partners in the Peer Review Process to take stock of the previous work and decide on future collaboration.

The Representative of Germany thanked the Director General for her comments. He very much welcomed the Director General's proposal to hold a meeting of all the main players of the Peer Review Process and felt it was important to restart a dialogue between the North-South Centre and the GENE network, two of the key players in this process. He provided detailed information on the Peer Review Process to date and the difficult discussions between the North-South Centre and the GENE network. With regard to the recent announcement by the German authorities not to proceed with the national peer review in 2007, he explained that this decision had been taken following the

scepticism shown by VENRO, a national NGO directly involved in the process, about the delays, the lack of clear terms of reference and the limited capacity of civil society representatives to participate at this time .

Both the Chairman and the Executive Director welcomed the proposed meeting for all of the main players in the Peer Review Process and hoped that a new impetus could be given to the process. The Chairman also commented on the very anglophone nature of the peer reviews to date, and suggested that more French speaking countries should be involved in this process.

- ***Line of action 2: Promoting North-South solidarity policies in conformity with the goals and principles of the Council of Europe through dialogue between Europe, the southern Mediterranean countries and Africa***

The Co-ordinator of the Dialogue Programme, Mr David Gakunzi, provided detailed information on the three main activities which would take place in the coming months. Each of these activities were being planned in the framework of the consultation process of the Council of Europe's "White Paper on Intercultural Dialogue". Firstly, a consultation of "Women and Intercultural Dialogue" to be held in April in Geneva, secondly, a meeting entitled "Migrants: actors and vectors of dialogue" in May in Lisbon and, lastly, a high level consultation in June in Lisbon.

With regard to the second half of the year, he mentioned the Conference of Parliamentarians that would be held on the fringe of the Summit of EU-Africa Heads of State and also the 2007 Lisbon Forum.

The Director General emphasised the importance of the role and contribution of the North-South Centre in facilitating the "White Paper" consultation process. She welcomed the visibility offered to the process by the North-South Centre and referred, in particular, to the contacts made by the Co-ordinator of the Dialogue Programme to secure a deal with Radio France to broadcast 20 programmes devoted to the "White Paper". This would offer enormous visibility to both the North-South Centre and the Council of Europe, as a whole.

In reply to a question from the Representative of Switzerland who sought clarification on the staff co-ordination of programmes three, four and five in view of the absence of Mrs Fifi Benaboud during 2007, the Executive Director replied that Mr Gakunzi was currently co-ordinating these programmes but that the imbalance of staffing between the two lines of action was being examined by the management of the Centre at present.

The Representative of Malta referred to the symposium on "Arab and Euro-Mediterranean women" which took place in Malta in February, and thanked the Executive Director for his intervention at this meeting.

- ***Programming and Communication Unit***

The Head of the Programming and Communication Unit, Mrs Eliana Carvalho, referred to the North-South Prize Ceremony due to take place the next day and thanked the Portuguese authorities, both the Government and Parliament, for its support. The 2006 prize winners were Mrs Mukhtaran Bibi, well known for her determination in promoting the women's rights in Pakistan and Father Van der Hoff, Founder of the Fair Trade Association Max Havelaar. The Head of the Programming and Communication Unit explained that the Centre had associated this

year's prize with the Council of Europe's campaign entitled "Stop domestic violence against women".

With regard to the multimedia tools of the Centre, she informed the Executive Council that the updating of the database of contacts had been completed and that a new structure for the Centre's website would be presented under point 9 of the agenda. She also mentioned the recent publications produced by the Centre and the new information bulletin which had received positive feedback from partners.

**- *Co-operation with the Enlarged Agreement on Democracy through Law ("Venice Commission")***

The Secretary of the Commission of the Enlarged Agreement on Democracy through Law ("Venice Commission"), Mr Gianni Buquicchio, thanked the Chairman for his invitation to participate at the meeting of the Executive Council. He expressed his long standing interest in the work of the North-South Centre and welcomed this opportunity to explore the possibilities of co-operation between the two Bodies. He referred to the first example of this collaboration, the Lisbon Forum, which took place in November 2006 and was very successful. He stated that the Venice Commission was very interested in working with African countries, especially those in North Africa and explained that the Venice Commission's particular focus was on technical assistance. Given the North-South Centre's many useful contacts in this region, he felt that the two Bodies could work together. He had noted with interest the proposed theme for the 2007 Lisbon Forum, "National human rights commissions – the cornerstone of the protection and promotion of human rights" and confirmed that the Venice Commission would like to be associated with this activity. He also mentioned training for good governance as another theme on which the two Bodies could work together and build synergies, with the Venice Commission willing to offer its technical expertise.

The Executive Director welcomed the possibilities of collaboration offered by the Secretary of the Venice Commission and the technical expertise it could offer to the Centre. He emphasised the importance of the theme of good governance at this time and referred to the Nepad peer review mechanism which had been created and to which their two Bodies could offer support through its joint activities.

The Chairman expressed his gratitude to the Secretary of the Venice Commission for having accepted the invitation to attend the meeting and thanked him for his constructive proposals. He hoped that their two Bodies could create concrete action plans together. The exact theme of the next Lisbon Forum would be discussed by the Bureau at its next meeting on 22 June 2007 and the Chairman was delighted that the Venice Commission would be willing to collaborate on this activity for the second time.

**6. Consideration of the main lines of action for the tri-annual workplan for 2008-2010**

The Executive Director presented the document outlining the main lines of action for the tri-annual workplan for 2008-2010. He explained that the document had been prepared taking into account the need to consolidate the institutional framework of the Centre's work in the future and to work more closely with the operational Directorates in Strasbourg. Another consideration was the need to develop and strengthen the Centre's networks and other partners. In the new tri-annual plan, emphasis would be placed on the Centre's role in the Council of Europe's "White Paper on Intercultural Dialogue", on its youth work and also its work on migration and co-development. The Executive Director explained that, following the adoption of this document

by the Executive Council, it would then be examined by the Committee of Representatives of the member States at its next meeting, and taking account of all comments received, the Secretariat would proceed with the preparation of a detailed workplan based on this lines of action.

The Representative of Switzerland, Mr Clemens Birrer, suggested that it would useful to assess the Centre's current position in terms of its programme orientations and to take these observations on board in the preparation of the tri-annual workplan for 2008-2010. This would enable the Centre to judge the feasibility of its proposed lines of action.

The Director General agreed with the suggestion of the Representative of Switzerland, however she felt that the developments over the next six months would also need to be taken into account. These would include the results of the discussions with Global Education partners, the Centre's enlargement perspectives and the Centre's potential future co-operation with the Venice Commission. She proposed that the Executive Council re-examine this question at its next meeting in November when all of the quadrilogue partners could be being associated with this process. The members of the Executive Council agreed to this proposal and adopted the document on this basis.

## **7. Strategy for enlargement**

The Executive Director presented the Centre's proposed strategy for enlargement, stressing the importance of attracting new members to the North-South Centre and how enlargement would help stabilise the financial situation of the Centre. He explained that this document had been prepared in consultation with the Legal Advice Department and Treaty Office of the Directorate General of Legal Affairs (DG I). The new fact that had come out of these consultations was the possibility of offering observer status to Council of Europe non-member States, as stipulated in the Committee of Ministers' Statutory Resolution (93) 28 on Partial and Enlarged Agreements.

During the exchange of views that followed on the proposed strategy, the members of the Executive Council welcomed the document and most agreed that countries from the South who did not want to or could not become members due to financial constraints, should be given the opportunity to have observer status.

Several members of the Executive Council expressed their scepticism at the likelihood of the European Union acceding to the Partial Agreement. In view of this, it was agreed that point 6 of the recommendations in the document be deleted.

The Director of External and Multilateral Relations suggested the possibility of creating a partnership status for certain groups of countries who had areas of specific common interest. The Director General welcomed this idea and also referred to the partnerships and co-operation agreement the Council of Europe had recently entered into. She pointed in particular the Memorandum of Understanding signed between the Arab League Educational, Cultural and Scientific Organization (ALECSO) and the Council of Europe and ALECSO's interest in a specific co-operation agreement with the North-South Centre. The Representative of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities encouraged the Centre to explore the possibility of memoranda of understanding with local governmental organisations.

In reply to a question from the Representative of Germany on how membership of the Partial Agreement could be made more attractive, the Director General pointed to the renewed mission of the Centre in light of the specific role identified for it in the Action Plan of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Summit of the Council of Europe.

## **8. Role and contribution of the quadrilogue partners**

The Executive Director presented the document on the role and contribution of the quadrilogue partners. He reminded the Executive Council that this document had been requested at the last meeting and that an initial exchange of views had been held on this subject by the Bureau at its January meeting.

### ***- Co-operation with the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe***

The Deputy Chief Executive of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe, Mrs Antonella Cagnolati, thanked the Chairman for his invitation to participate in the Executive Council meeting. She welcomed this opportunity to share some information with the members of the Executive Council on the priority areas of work of the Congress and, in particular, on those areas where synergies could be developed between the Congress and the North-South Centre. She referred to Dr Micallef's discussions with the Bureau members at its meeting of 16 January and confirmed that the Bureau of the Congress would be examining the proposals made by Dr Micallef following these discussions. The proposals contained ideas for co-operation and the relevant modalities. The Congress had taken note of the Co-operation Agreement signed between the PACE and the North-South Centre and a similar agreement could perhaps be explored by the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe, as recommended in its Recommendation 183 (2006).

The Deputy Chief Executive the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe pointed to the migration questions, co-operation with countries from the South and the role of citizenship as areas of common interest through which the Centre and the Congress could develop links. She proposed that the possibilities of co-operation be explored in 2007, for inclusion in the 2008 programme of activities. She also suggested that the North-South Centre should be invited and represented at the main meetings and activities of the Congress and would take measures to ensure this. In the same vein, she felt that the Congress needed to have a stronger and more active representation within the Executive Council and Bureau. To this end, the Chairman proposed that the Bureau meeting participation could be enlarged to allow for additional representation by the Congress.

The Representative of the Congress, Mr Ken Bodfish, welcomed the suggestions made by the Deputy Chief Executive of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe. With regard to the Congress' representation at the meetings of the Bureau and Executive Council, he felt that more regular communication and consultation would improve the situation.

The Director General agreed with the comments and suggestions made by the Deputy Chief Executive of the Congress of Local and Regional Authorities of the Council of Europe and the Chairman's proposal for an enlarged Bureau. Referring to the document presented on the role and contribution of the quadrilogue partners, she urged the quadrilogue partners to work together and have more interaction with one another. She encouraged the quadrilogue partners to come forward with their own proposals which could be integrated into the annual programme of activities and thereby give them a stronger sense of ownership of the Centre's programme of activities.

The Chairman of the North-South Dialogue and Solidarity Grouping of the INGOs enjoying Participatory Status with the Council of Europe, Mr Michel Julien, presented a project proposal to the Executive Council (see appendix 1). The Chairman thanked the North-South Dialogue and Solidarity Grouping for this proposal and it was agreed that the Bureau would examine it at its next meeting on 22 June 2007.

## **9. Any other business**

### *- New North-South Centre website*

A proposed new structure of the North-South Centre's website was presented to the Executive Council and was favourably received. The Chairman commented on the importance of updating it regularly.

### *- Retirement of Mr Jack Hanning, Director of External and Multilateral Relations*

In view of the fact that this would be the last meeting of the Executive Council which Mr Jack Hanning would attend before his retirement, the Chairman took this opportunity to express his sincere thanks and gratitude for all the hard work, efforts and contribution Mr Hanning had made to the North-South Centre over the past ten years.

## **10. Date and place of next meeting**

It was agreed that the next meeting would take place on **Thursday 15 November 2007 in Strasbourg.**

**PROPOSITION POUR ETENDRE LA PLATE-FORME DE DIALOGUE POLITIQUE SUR LES INITIATIVES ETHIQUES ET SOLIDAIRES DANS LA LUTTE CONTRE LA PAUVRETE AUX PAYS DU MAGREB (ci-déterminée Plate-forme)**

- a. La Plate-forme est une initiative co-financée par le Conseil de l'Europe et la DG Emploi de la Commission Européenne. Elle se propose de soutenir le dialogue à quatre niveaux:
  - entre les initiatives éthiques et solidaires (finance éthique, consommation responsable, commerce équitable, nouveaux rapports entre consommateurs et producteurs, insertion par la solidarité) elles-mêmes organisées en Inter-réseau d'initiatives éthiques et solidaires (IRIS) ;
  - entre IRIS et les services gouvernementaux chargés de la lutte contre l'exclusion ;
  - entre IRIS et les autorités locales/régionales et les ONG engagées dans des approches plus classiques de lutte contre la pauvreté au niveau des territoires;
  - entre IRIS, les ONG engagées dans la lutte contre la pauvreté et les autorités locales et régionales au niveau de l'appui à des populations vulnérables.
- b. L'objectif de ces formes de dialogue est triple :
  - améliorer les synergies entre pouvoirs publics et initiatives citoyennes pour rendre la lutte contre la pauvreté plus efficace ;
  - faire de la lutte contre la pauvreté une composante de la citoyenneté ;
  - affirmer la légitimité des démarches éthiques et solidaires et les concepts dont elles sont porteuses comme indispensables pour une société plus équitable.
- c. L'expérience que cette Plate-forme est en train de développer peut servir de soutien à un projet similaire dans les pays du Maghreb. Il s'agira de favoriser d'une part la naissance de ce type d'initiatives, leur lien avec les réseaux et les pays européens impliqués dans la démarche et d'autre part de permettre une meilleure coordination avec d'autres politiques de lutte contre la pauvreté. Evidemment, il ne s'agit pas de « reproduire » les démarches entreprises dans les pays du Nord, mais plutôt de développer des chemins de citoyenneté et des synergies avec les autorités publiques autour des concepts de commerce équitable, consommation responsable, finance solidaire, etc en les adaptant aux contextes et environnements des pays concernés.
- d. Un projet de ce type se traduira par un renforcement des liens entre réseaux européens et initiatives dans le Sud, en donnant aux uns et aux autres l'opportunité d'avancer dans des démarches de citoyenneté.
- e. L'expertise pour ce projet sera fournie par les membres des réseaux membres d'IRIS ainsi que par les membres des ONG de la Commission de Liaison des OING du Conseil de l'Europe intéressés dans le développement des démarches éthiques et solidaires pour combattre la pauvreté.
