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### **Summary of projects drawn up and implemented by youth delegates**

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Country	Youth delegate	Project
Albania	COPA Besart	<p>Educating the Albanian youth in Tirana on the functions of the Congress at an international level and how this is significant to us at a local level. This goal is to be achieved by cooperation with the Department of Youth of the Municipality of Tirana. The plan is specifically divided into two core projects:</p> <p>1) Working with the foundations of Tirana's youth council  2) Working with the staff of the Department of Youth. In addition to working with these two parts in order to promote youth participation and democracy at local and regional levels, I am also working for their participation in organizations of greater governance, such as the Council of Europe, and the United Nations (always talking about youth participation) <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Armenia	POGHIOSYAN Lida	<p>The project aims to raise awareness of young people on the ways they could be involved in the matters concerning them and to promote the youth participation through the implementation of the Revised European Charter on the Participation of Young People in Local and Regional Life and its best practices and methodologies.</p> <p>The target group will be informed about the role, activities and functions of the Council of Europe with the spotlight on the Congress and the role of youth delegates. <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Austria	OSL Clemens	<p>Since 2007, an active voting right in Austria is bestowed on young people aged 16. Nonetheless, among many young voters their understanding of politics has proven not very high. Often this deficit can, as it seems, be easily overcome by allowing young people to get in touch with political institutions and dynamics at an early age already, to gain their own impressions and insights.</p> <p>To get acquainted with the regimes of transnational cooperation – to which political education, for some reason, still pays low attention – around 35 young pupils aged 15-17 of the Federal High School “Bregenz-Blumenstrasse” (Austria) will undertake a study trip to Strasbourg. During their stay, they will attend the Congress’ plenary session (19/10/2016, 14h15), visit the European Court of Human Rights, the European Parliament, and get in touch with some of the youth delegates.</p> <p>The main aim is to encourage the pupils to develop a clear understanding of democracy, of rule of law as a guarantee for stability and security, and of human rights as the fundamental basis for peaceful coexistence in our pluralist societies. In preparation for their visit, I gave an introductory class on transnational politics. <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Azerbaijan	ALIYEVA Sevil	<p>Raise awareness of the youth policy of the Congress amongst Azerbaijani youth and active youth participation in the local democracy of Azerbaijan; <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Belgium	GODEAUX Nastassia	<p>To raise youth awareness of the ways they could be involved in the matters concerning them and support the youth participation in the local and regional communities. The project's goal is to familiarize young people with the idea of getting informed, exchanging ideas, being able to debate on different topics concerning them and offering solutions formed into arguments, concrete enough to be presented in the related authorities" (Alkistis Giogou, Youth delegate from Greece). Greece	GIOGIOU Alkistis	<p>The Youth Us Project aims to raise youth awareness through the implementation of the Revised European Charter on the Participation of Young People in Local and Regional Life. The target group will be informed about the work, the significance and the tools of the CoE &amp; the CLRA, along with its basic principles &amp; the role of the youth delegates. Therefore, I have been invited to share my experience and spread the project in the national TV channels ERT1,TV100 &amp; ERT3 (on 26.3.16,28-29.3.16) &amp; I have held 4 seminars in local schools (on 14.4.16,20.4.16,09.5.16,9/2016), to an audience of 240 children (12–16 years old).A group of 40 students have applied for the project, have learned about some practices of the Charter (info tests, polls, leaflets ,diagrams etc),are currently editing a video about raising youth awareness which will be launched internationally through the social media and will shortly attend official meetings in order to learn about the Charter &amp; discuss the topics of the 31st Session. <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Hungary	VINCZI Alexandra	<p>Raise awareness amongst youngsters with the topics of active citizenship, democracy and participation. I wish to gather good practices and new and fresh opinions on the matters concerning Local and Regional Authorities, and make sure that the great ideas of young people back home are really heard. I wish to contribute to teaching our youngsters how to be part of a new kind of society, where the decisions are made considering all points of views.</p> <p>Ultimately I would like to show the target group of my project the international dimension of the project – since many of us youth delegates are working with the same basic ideas – and show them that although we live in different parts of Europe, youngsters are ready and want to be involved everywhere. <a href="#">Report</a></p>

Iceland	EINARSDOTTIR Rut	<p>After the last congress session I went and met with the recently founded Youth Council in my hometown. Although they had existed for over a year, they had made no real impact, as they did not know where to start. After speaking to other youth delegates we have realized that this is an all too common problem all over Europe, and providing a concrete report of best practices will give ideas and inspiration to young leaders all over Europe, giving them further unity. <a href="#">Report</a></p>
Ireland	KEATING Lucas	<p>My project set out to find ways to encourage young people to become involved in politics and bridge the divide between elected representatives and young people. I want to include young people in a constructive discussion around the topics being discussed in politics, and thus give them the opportunity for their word to be relayed directly, restore their confidence in politics and give them the will to fight for their interests. Too often the voice and opinions of young people are not heard! First I began by meeting various youth groups, Waterford Youth County Council, Ogra Fianna Fail (Young Fianna Fail) and began discussing with its young members how they became interested in politics as well as educating them on the work of the COE and CLRA. I also contacted every youth town and county council in Ireland - almost 50 - and again asked for their opinions on this matter - how can we encourage more young people to get involved in politics? After this I went to my local school, Colaiste Muire Cobh. I am involved in Politics I applied for this position as Youth Delegate for Ireland because I found myself wanting to make a difference. I began to wonder, a person either wants to make a difference or doesn't, can we change this? how can a persons' mind-set be changed? it's like some people will play soccer, some will play hurling. I then began to look at this and began wondering why do some towns have a higher percentage of people playing soccer over hurling and some have a higher percentage laying hurling over soccer. The reason - the opportunities and facilities provided by the club. If the soccer club is active in encouraging young people to get involved in the club, then of course it will have a very high membership rate. So to encourage young people to become involved in politics we should apply the same method. We need councils and the government to become active in encouraging young people to become involved in decisions that are being made and to look for the opinions that young people have. I then met with the secretary of my national delegation, Mr Liam Kenny, and we began to look at this. We decided that we could look to lobby the Irish Government to sign the revised European Charter on the Participation of Young People in Local and Regional Life. This charter is signed by some nations already but is not signed by the Irish Government. We felt together that if we could begin to lobby various groups and try to get this document signed by the government it would help to encourage young people to get involved in politics as they would see the Government making an effort to recognize young people. The active participation of young people in decisions and actions at local and regional level is essential if we are to build more democratic, inclusive and prosperous societies.</p> <p>Local and regional authorities, as the authorities closest to the young person, have a very important role to play in promoting youth participation and they will be the first group that we begin to lobby. This will be undoubtedly a long process, and more than likely will not be signed by the October session but we will work to ensure that this document will get signed by the Government. Moldova	DONI Corneliu	<p>My project consists of monitoring the local public administration from Chisinau. I formed an initiative group with 3 people and we analyse the activity of the mayor of the city and the local council. We focused on the problem of the excess of the billboards. In order to understand better the point of view of citizens, we created a local survey in which 781 people from Chisinau participated and the results were very disappointing. 78% are dissatisfied with the activity of local public administration and 90,3% dislike the aspect of the city. Therefore, we sent our results to our local public authorities and asked them to undertake concrete actions in order to solve the problem of billboards. We advertised our activity on some youth Facebook groups, sites of different NGOs and soon I will participate on a national radio show where I will speak about our activity.</p>
